## Rain

*Considering the summer we've just had, some thoughts on this subject.*

A blind man described the different sounds rain makes. Standing in the garden one particularly wet day he listened. He heard the patter of raindrops on leaves & shrubs, & then the softer sound as it fell on the wet lawn. As he listened he heard the rain also falling on the gravel of the path, sounding harsher, & then again as it hit the tiles on the roof top & ran down the slope. Dripping from a leaky guttering, it splashed persistently on a stone, with a regular beat. He said "I hadn't realised how different the sounds of raindrops could be until then".

It made me wonder about the various ways we "hear" God. Perhaps our perception & experience of God depend on how well we listen & use our other senses. To some people God is the all loving, comforting father, the one they turn to for help & guidance. Others experience Him as a rather uncomfortable presence, always challenging them with new thoughts & taking them in directions they're not sure of. Others may hear Him like a steady dripping of water on a stone, asking them for a response. And some don't hear Him at all, assuming He's not there, when it's really the noise of their other priorities that is drowning Him out.

There isn't a right way to hear God any more than there's a right way to hear rain. It all depends on where we stand & how we listen. Everyone hears God differently because our personalities & needs are different. But beyond the differing ways God speaks, as with the different sounds rain makes, it's good to remember that though the rain falls differently at different times, whether gently or heavily, in sunshine or in the storm, essentially it always renews life, encourages growth & brings fruit.

### Children of the Brick Making Community.

The Trustees of Aqueduct would like to take this opportunity to express our sincere thanks to Trinity for the gift of £400.

This year we have undertaken to open another school on the outskirts of Lahore for Gypsy children, who would otherwise have no opportunity for education, and also a school for brick labourers children, the community of which are around 95% illiterate.

Aqueduct now funds the running of six schools, including adult education and sewing classes for women (who remain very much hidden in society). We pay for the teachers and materials. Although it has to be open to all, it benefits Christian communities who are very much under pressure in a Muslim culture. We seek to break the poverty cycle aiming at starting self sustaining micro finance projects and education for both children and adults.

The spiritual side is also not neglected. Money is allocated to provide Bibles, which are then distributed by the pastors to their congregations. All is overseen by the bishop of the area, who decides upon the projects needed.

We meet regularly to discuss the various projects, needs and prayer as to the way forward. Financial reports are sent to us regularly, along with project reports and photos. One trustee usually visits once a year.

Being a small, but rapidly growing charity our overheads are small and absorbed by the trustees, therefore 100% of money donated is spent on the various projects.

As you can imagine, your donation will help us a great deal, so once again thank you.

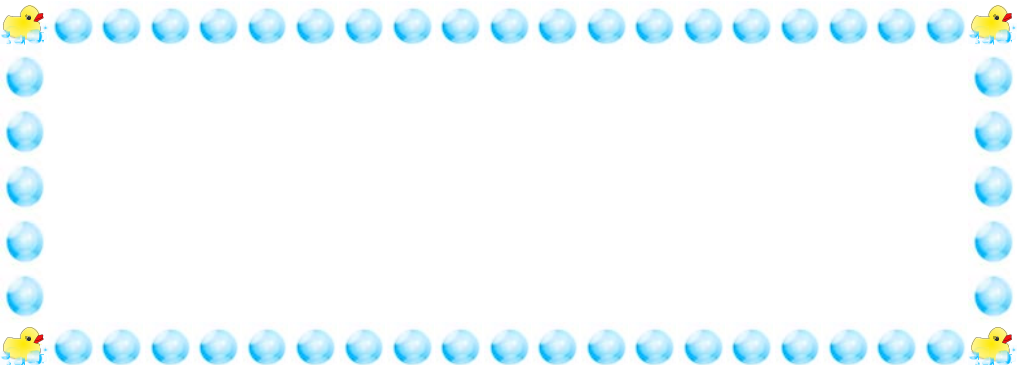

Notes from the London Men's Convention

Saturday 29<sup>th</sup> March Royal Albert Hall

## **Theme "Recharged for maximum impact – Be Men with a message"**

"The Truth about Hell" - Al Stewart

Revelation 20: 11 – 15

The bible tells us that God is angry and we find indifference is the opposite of love. God will judge the cruelty and immorality of the world and the bible teaches about the values of human life.

Jesus teaches that privilege brings responsibility, look at Mark 11: 20&21 and ask:

Why it would be worse for they had done nothing, except ignore Jesus.

We take good things we are given and turn them into idols.

Treat God as God and don't walk away from him without knowing the consequences. God will judge, cruelty, greed, selfishness and for ignoring him. Judgement will happen.

Revelation shows what will happen between the first and second coming.

- 1) Revelation 1:11 God will take his seat ( see Daniel 7 and Revelation 4)  
Revelation 22: 1 God and the lamb
- 2) Revelation 1:12 God will judge every individual – John 5:28  
In Revelation it tells us that the books will be opened to show what we have done; for we will be called to account.
- 3) Revelation 1:13 God will judge with justice and each will be judge according to what they have done. Everything will be dealt fairly in God's account.

Everything will be correct and dealt with fairly.

Jesus will take our punishment, or are we going our own way?

Being spiritually dead is separation from God, as expressed in verse 14 & 15.

Jesus was the most compassionate man, yet he is the greatest hell fire preacher.

Jesus taught more about hell than anything else.

Matthew 6: 21, direct not subtle.

Matthew 10:28, gives us a picture of hell.

You cannot have the real Jesus without his teaching of hell and eternal judgement.

Jesus' teaching about hell is frightening, hell, burning, prison, no escape, people in darkness, grinding of teeth.

No peace keepers or social workers in hell.

No repentance or change of heart as the gift of God will not be available. How can it be just? God will give what they have asked for Philippians 1: 8&9.

Language of eternal life and punishment are the same v15.

One way to avoid the lake of fire is to have your name written in the book of life.

Reality doesn't change because you don't want to hear about it.

In Christian ministry we need to believe in hell.

Some believe but don't practice it.

We need to mean what we say about judgement day and hell.

In Acts it showed on their faces because they believed the danger.

Evangelism needs to include the message about judgment and hell.

We need to be relevant to our society.

We chase the non Christian world.

The church runs after the political situation.

The church mentions the good things but not the consequence of ignoring God.

We are all on our way to appear before the judgement seat of God.

We have the way to show men how they can avoid it.

God is good and he is right.

Let your heart reach out to him.

We are responsible for what we do.

Does our heart ache for our towns, villages and cities?

Does our heart really ache about knowing God?

## Book Review

### **God on Mute**

(Engaging the Silence of Unanswered Prayer)

by Pete Grieg

This is a great book, which is written with complete honesty and with no attempt to give easy answers to the difficult questions we are sometimes afraid to ask. The fact that it is written by a man who believes passionately in the power of prayer (Pete Grieg co-founded the 24/7 prayer initiative) makes it even more authentic.

The unanswered prayer at the heart of the book is for Pete's wife's healing from epilepsy, which is the legacy of an operation to remove a life-threatening brain tumour. That she survived the operation, physically (apart from the epilepsy) and mentally intact, was itself an answer to many people's prayers.

In his book Pete addresses the questions of why some prayers are answered, even miraculously, and other prayers are apparently ignored.

In parallel with his wife's story, Pete traces Jesus' last days from Thursday in Gethsemane, through Friday at Golgotha, the silence of Holy Saturday and then to the rejoicing of Easter Sunday.

If you are thinking this must be a depressing, faith-undermining book you couldn't be more wrong! It contains many stories of wonderfully answered prayer and encourages us to persevere, knowing that God is always present and at work even when our experience is denying Him.

I first read a borrowed copy of this book but have bought my own so that I can read it again and share it with anyone who would like to borrow it - form an orderly queue!

# **Firestorm UK “The conference” Part 1**

Being out early on the M25 on a Wednesday morning is not normally a place I would expect to be without a very good reason and purpose for it. In the July/August edition of Trinity News you may recall an article giving a record of the events so far that have been observed in the moving of God’s spirit across the nations. Today was an opportunity to travel with expectation and hear reports from those who had been to Lakeland Florida and shared in the experience first hand but equally important was to hear receive the teaching on the “Fire” (Father’s Impartation for Revival through Evangelism).

Having made very good progress after our early start we arrived with enough time to seek out a cup of coffee in the only place open in the village of Chorleywood, the local supermarket, before joining the other delegate’s in fellowship before the doors opened.

After the necessary house keeping instructions which produced some hilarity and relaxed everybody present the conference moved on.

Andrew Williamson (Associate vicar at St Andrews and who has also experienced Lakeland) shared with those present.

***“Lakeland is raw and real, all testimonies testify to the Glory of God”***

He moved on to sharing some thoughts on “The Glory” opening Gods word at Psalm 139 before encouraging us to look at and see the different facets that can be applied and to see that it is the sum total of God’s attributes and we can press on into that glory;

God is personal

God is Holy

God is Merciful

God is just

God is jealous

God is faithful

God is truthful

God is unchangeable

God is Spirit  
God is King of Kings  
God is Father

Press forward and focus on Jesus.

God's glory brings everything to a standstill

In the Old Testament the glory is referred to 22 times and in the New Testament we find;

Glory described as praise and honour.

Jesus is worthy of the honour.

Worship happened spontaneously.

The people "...all of his followers began to shout and sing as they walked along praising God for all the wonderful miracles they had seen."  
Luke 19:37 (Tyndale version).

Who gets the glory?

Let us look at the scriptures;

Gen 1:1, Psalm 23:6, Psalm 75: 6&7, Psalm 131:14, John 6:44, Romans 8: 38&39, Ephesians 1:7, 1Cor: 4:7.

How do we enter?

1 Chron. 16:10, 24, 29, Psalm 29, Psalm 66, Psalm 96, Philippians 2:11

We press on in the power of the spirit.

Mark Stibbe (Vicar of St Andrews) then began to share

God is in the House.

It is a joy to be here at the conference.

There is a sense of Kingdom closure.

There is a high demand for revival within the nation.

The he turned to answer the question,

“Discernment in Revival”

Is Lakeland a genuine movement of God?

Some are saying:

Is there a need for this subject?

Unnatural and having heresy that deviates from revival policy.

Generally against Lakeland.

To answer the critics we need to ask;

- 1) Has the person been
- 2) Is the person of godly character?

You have to absorb and see on the ground for much is not available when watching on God TV or via the Internet.

We are called to discern, 1Cor. 12: 8-10.

There is a need to judge between spirits, to be careful and discern.

We need to make sure it is scriptural.

When it is close to the real thing we have to check it out and be aware that if it is not real it is decisive.

What I saw in Lakeland;

- 1) Praising until the breakthrough came.
- 2) A recovery of the gospel and power.
- 3) A very prophetic sense/
- 4) Testifying to what the Lord has done.
- 5) Greater signs and wonders than the west is used to.
- 6) Expectation rather than fragile hope.
- 7) A kingdom use of media and technology.
- 8) Imparting the anointing for Evangelism.

Nothing happens until God's word is spoken.

If you watch Lakeland on the TV or via the internet then you aren't always aware of what is going on earlier in the day, there is training for evangelism before teams take the message on to the streets. Prayer for the sick carries on all over the meeting place, as people share in small groups.

We can apply the following tests:

- 1) Check with scripture that what is said about Jesus Christ and lifts him higher.
- 2) It has to be consistent and is not inconsistent with scripture.
- 3) Looking at discernment and see that it has content and substance rather than culture and style. God looks at the heart and we need to open them to the compassion of Jesus.
- 4) The test of consequence encourages us to look at the hunger for our Lord for we don't give enough credit to him. Too often we don't examine the fruit but pick off the worker.
- 5) Have we conviction that the gospel truth is ringing in my heart and in 1 John 4:1 we are encouraged to test the Spirit. Acts 5 reminds us that if it is the work of man it will come to nothing but if it is the work of God will continue.

Look at the fruit as people are discovering God is powerful and he is encouraging them to carry the anointing to the people.

There is a firestorm in the UK and we have the responsibility to steward it. Impartation is to go out with the gospel and the gifts to bring healing and revival to the Land.

We can see a God given out breakout and God will send fire on the front line of mission, as we care for the broken and lost where they are.
